Glasgow, The Heart of The Institution in Scotland

- Half the population of Scotland is within a 30 minute drive of the centre of Glasgow.

- The biggest concentration of MSP's is in and around Glasgow.
- Glasgow is home to one of the two most important Government Ministries for the Construction Industry ``Enterprise and Lifelong Learning``, Minister Henry McLeish.

Glasgow, The Centre of Civil Engineering Education

- There is a longer term possibility of obtaining accommodation at The Scottish Engineering Centre, the heart of learned society activity in Scotland.
- The Scottish Parliament in Edinburgh is only 45 mins by train from Central Glasgow.
- There are excellent means of communication by road, rail and air between Glasgow and all the major regions and cities in Scotland.
- Apart from communication with Ayr and Dumfries, which are closer to Glasgow, travelling time from Glasgow or Edinburgh to the other regions and cities is similar.
